Bulla Spoils Facility Community update: August 2022



Hi-Quality Group's Bulla Spoils Facility, at 570 Sunbury Road, has been taking soil from the West Gate Tunnel Project (WGTP) tunnel boring machines (TBMs) since March, and we'd like to give you the latest update from the site, and answer your questions.



Achieving major milestones

About 12 months ago, we started major construction on the purpose-built Bulla Spoils Facility. In March, we finished the key parts that enabled us to begin accepting soil and as of August we have now completed all construction at the Facility.

The Facility includes 59 engineered holding bays where material is first placed when it arrives on site, three pre-treatment ponds, a purpose-built water treatment plant that removes any contaminants and returns the water to safe drinking levels, and an approximately 25-hectare containment cell with multi-layer lining to safely store remaining soil.

This Facility is a tailored solution for one of Australia's biggest infrastructure projects and has used industry-leading technology to protect the local communities, and surrounding areas. We're proud to see it come to life and want to thank our specialist teams for the hard work, and the community for their patience.

In April, the WGTP's second TBM, Vida, started operations. With both TBMs now operating there has been a gradual increase in soil delivered to our Facility. Trucks continue operating 24 hours a day, seven days a week, following the primary approved route which has been used since March.

Doing more to keep the roads clean

With the volume of activity taking place along Sunbury Road, we know the cleanliness has been a real concern for residents in recent months.

While Major Roads Projects Victoria (MRPV) upgrades Sunbury Road, they are conducting regular cleaning along the entire road, aiming to make it safe and clean for all road users. We've also worked with the surrounding projects, the West Gate Tunnel Project and EPA Victoria to improve our on-site processes and prevent material leaving the Facility as much as possible.

Since operations began, trucks have always been required to travel through a wheel-wash before exiting the Facility. We have since made improvements to this process to further minimise our impact on road users.

The upgraded cleaning process includes:

- 1. A dedicated scrape-down area to remove excess material from the inside of the trucks.
- 2. A high-pressure hose and water cannon system to wash down external areas on the trucks.
- 3. Requiring all trucks to go through a longer and more thorough wheel wash.

The West Gate Tunnel Project builder, CPB John Holland Joint Venture, has also extended controls on trucks leaving the site in Yarraville to ensure all locks and seals are in place and completed a driver education program to help drivers be more aware of what can cause spills.

The trucks transporting soil are covered and sealed at the back by a compression seal, with tail gate and grain locks to prevent leakage before embarking on their journey. All trucks must meet EPA Victoria requirements, be fully assessed for road worthiness and compliance with noise and emission limits and follow approved truck routes between Yarraville and Hi-Quality's facility.

- · Started discussions on how we can further support projects funded through the West Gate Tunnel Project's Sunbury & Bulla Neighbourhood Fund either through financial or material donations.

Testing shows low PFAS levels

Our facility has been built to ensure a conservative approach and has measures in place to ensure people and the environment are kept safe. The amount of PFAS detected in soil that has gone to the facility so far has been at the very low level expected before tunnelling began. It is expected that more PFAS will be detected in soil as tunnelling continues.
